However, like the proposition 13 of the 70's we again have propositions that may appear to have an immediate benefit but have longer term consequences we don't intend. Be very wary of tinkering with the machinery of our democracy.

Summary of June Ballot Propositions

(Summaries from the Calif. Secretary of State Website)

Proposition 13 - Limits on Property Tax Assessment. Seismic retrofitting of existing buildings: Legislativley-referred constitutional amendment.

- Provides that construction to seismically retrofit buildings will not trigger reassessment of property tax value.
- Sets statewide standard for seismic retrofit improvements that qualify.
- Limits the exemption from reassessment to specific components of contruction or reconstruction that qualify as seismic retrofit improvements, as defined by the Legislature

Fiscal Impact Estimate: Minor reduction in local property tax revenues related to the assessment of earthquake upgrades

Proposition 14 -Primary election process reform. Greater participation in elections:

Legislativley-referred constitutional amendment.

- Encourages increased participation in elections for congressional, legislative and statewide offices by reforming the procedure by which candidates are selected in primary elections.
- Gives voters increased options by allowing all voters to choose any candidate regardless of the candidate's or voter's political party preference.
- Ensures that the two candidates receiving the greatest number of votes will appear on the general election ballot regardless of party preference.
- Does not change primary elections for President, party committee offices, and nonpartisan offices.

Fiscal Impact Estimate: No significant net change in state and local government costs to administer elections Proposition 15 - California Fair Elections Act: legislatively-referred state statute.

- This act creates a voluntary system for candidates for Secretary of State to qualify for a public campaign grant if they agree to strict spending limits and take no private contributions
- Candidates would have to qualify before receiving the grant.
- Candidates who demonstrate sufficient public support would receive the same amount.
- Participating candidates would be prohibited from raising or spending money beyond the grant.
- There would be strict enforcement and accountability with published reports open to the public.
- Funded by voluntary contributions and by a \$350 annual registration fee on lobbyists, lobbying firms, and lobbyist employees.

Fiscal Impact Estimate: Increased revenues totaling over \$6 million every four years. These funds would be spent on public financing for campaigns of Secretary of State candidates for the 2014 and 2018 elections.

Proposition 16 – Imposes new two-thirds voter approval requirement for local public electricity providers: Initiative Constitutional Amendment.

- Requires local governments to obtain the approval of two-thirds of the voters before providing electricity service to new customers or expanding such service to new territories using public funds or bonds.
- Requires same two-thirds to provide electricity service through a community choice program using public funds or bonds.
- Requires the vote to be in the jurisdiction of the local government and any new territory to be served.
- Provides exceptions to the voting requirements for a limited number of identified projects.

Fiscal Impact Estimate:

Unknown net impact on state and local government costs and revenues due to uncertainty as to the measure's effects on public electricity providers and on electricity rates. These effects are unlikely to be significant in the short run.

Proposition 17 - Allows Auto Insurance Companies to Base Their Prices in Part on a Driver's History of Insurance Coverage: Initiative Statute.

- Changes current law to permit insurance companies to offer a discount to drivers who have continuously maintained their auto insurance coverage, even if they change their insurance company, and not withstanding the ban on using absence of prior insurance for purposes of pricing.
- May allow insurance companies to increase cost of insurance to drivers who do not qualify for a discount.
- Establishes that lapses in coverage due to nonpayment of premiums may prevent a driver from qualifying for a discount.

Fiscal Impact Estimate: Probably no significant fiscal effect on state insurance premium tax revenues.
