President's Message:

Things seem to be quite slow this year as we celebrate the incredible successes of our state in bucking the Republican national trend in electing Democrats to every statewide race, defending each and every Congressional Democratic seat, and increasing our majorities in the state legislature. Looking forward, we are working towards the reelection of President Obama next year.

Locally, we can be proud that we elected two strong progressive voices in Congresswoman Karen Bass and Assemblywoman Holly Mitchell. We can gloat that 80% of our local elected officials are registered Democrats. We can feel secure in the fact that we have one of the most wellrespected Democratic Clubs in the region and that little Culver City has seven delegates to this statewide convention. We can appreciate Culver City's important role in state politics when the redistricting commission chooses our community as the locale for their very first public hearing with the first draft of the newly drawn maps (June 16th at 6:00 in City Hall, by the way).

However, every time that I attend these conventions I leave with some more cautious optimism. While I share in the legitimate pride that comes from all of the hard work and resulting accomplishments, I also understand that Democratic Party control alone does not necessarily lead to progressive reform. Our city council, which has had at least four Democratic members since 1994, has a long history of not approving nearly enough affordable housing (See President, Page 2)

At last month's club meeting, a panel with a school board member, a city council member, and 2 union presidents (all four Culver City Democrats) could not agree on the best ways to solve the budgetary crisis in our local government institutions. And here at theDemocratic state convention, it looks like a resolution supporting the commutation of all death penalty cases to life imprisonment may not even get a floor vote.

How can we expect to bring about large-scale social and political change when we Democrats cannot even agree on the shape and scope of that change? It is time for us to look inward, to "clean house." I don't mean purging all who dare to disagree with a tenet of our platform, but instead to educate those within our ranks on what it means to be a progressive. Winning is no longer enough, we need to do a better job governing.
