President's Message by Pete Rockwell The program for the February meeting

I first joined the Culver City Democratic Club in the summer of 2017. I went to a membership meeting and asked to circulate a petition I'd started to have a march for healthcare for all on the first anniversary of the Womens' March. As things turned out there was a second Womens' March on the date I had picked in January of 2018, and Cynthia Hart (my new wife) and I marched in it together. We have marched together in all three Womens' Marches in Los Angeles.

Cynthia and I first met at the Fiesta La Ballona in August of 2015. We were volunteers handing out leaflets for the brand new long-shot presidential campaign of Bernie Sanders. Cynthia had been a member of CCDC off and on for nearly thirty years, but she had not been very active as a member.

Practically the day we went to our first meeting together we learned that the Corresponding Secretary of the Club, who had also been editing this newsletter, had just quit both tasks. Cynthia soon became the new Corresponding Secretary and I became the editor of the newsletter.

We both voted for Bernie in the California primary and for Hillary in the general election.

The only political experience I had before coming to the CCDC was as a union activist. I'm retired now, but in my life I have been a member of six different unions and I've worked full time for the Typographical Union and the United Food and Commercial Workers.

So... I join the Club and boom! I'm putting out the monthly newsletter. Then a year and a half later, boom! I'm president of the Club. It's the kind of thing that might go to a man's head if he wasn't aware that nobody else wanted the job.

But I have a plan.

People are so mad at the would-be oligarchs in the Republican Party right now that they are joining the Resistance in greater numbers than I've seen in my lifetime, and I first voted in 1968—way back when you had to be 21 to vote. All we have to do is channel enough of that energy and determination into the Democratic Party to make the old donkey start kicking again like it did in the days of Franklin Roosevelt.

Jewel of Culver City: Mayme A Clayton Library & Museum

Untapped treasure lies in plain view on the busy street of Overland in Culver City. A former courthouse has been renovated into the Mayme A. Clayton library & museum of African American history.

Director Lloyd Clayton gave the Culver City Democratic Club member Craig Scott and me, Recording Secretary Shannon Theus, a personal tour and interview. He told us about the indomitable will of his mother, Mayme A. Clayton, and her passion to uncover the truth and grandeur of Black history in order to empower the world with it.

The museum's rare national treasures include a 1773 edition of Phyllis Wheatley's book of poems signed by Wheatley herself. She is one of America's first acclaimed poets, who was kidnapped from her village and forced into slavery. Her poetry, so beautiful, freed her of slavery and made her a highly esteemed guest of George Washington, and was written about by Thomas Jefferson. Fellow Black poet Langston Hughes has also left a signed note in his book of poems.

The halls of the museum tell a history

through sound, pairing albums to rare photos and texts. Nina Simone's jazz recording "Mississippi Goddamn" lies near photos of the domestic terrorism being afflicted upon Blacks. Next to Lena Horne's "Strange Fruit" album, hangs the actual photo of the lynching that inspired the poem by Abel Meeropol—who wrote the song that Lena Horne sang.

These jewels of the past have not been ignored. The collection has been educating Americans about their own history for years. Alex Haley consulted Mayme and her library to find out about his own family's history, which led to the epic saga *Roots*. Haley thanks Mayme in his signed copy of the book, which is part of the museum's collection, along with a signed letter from Martin Luther King Jr.

I personally found myself staring faceto-face with my own history, as I surprisingly stumbled upon a signed picture from my deceased father, Jazz drummer and member of Sun Ra's Arkestra: Sonship Theus (he died 7 years ago). In fact, the museum had a file on my family the Theus', which included

my cousin: former NBA player & Coach Reggie Theus along with esteemed Theus's of the military. Astonished, I couldn't stop crying.

"Amazing" is the only word I can use to describe the effect of the library and museum, which is a storehouse of incredible pieces of history. A view into the vault, and one would see a table-sized inventory of slaves; letters from renowned members of the Black community that spans from before the birth of the nation; posters of rare Black cinema like that of Porgy & Bess performed by Dorothy Dandridge and Sidney Portier. The museum owns one of the few copies left in existence and showcases rare cinema like this each month. It also has events like jazz concerts, readings and retirement workshops. Walking in I had no idea how transformed I would be upon walking out.

The most valuable untapped treasure lies within this museum's ability to transform your understanding of self by teaching you (regardless of your background) America's history. Black history. Your history.

Letter to the Editor

At our February 13, 2019, meeting I will make a motion that the Club send a letter of support for the Mayme Clayton Library to County Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas telling him how much we value having this treasure house of rarities related to the history and culture of African Americans remain in Culver City. Supervisor Ridley-Thomas has announced plans to evict the museum from the former courthouse building where it is currently located.
