Dear members and supportive friends, this past weekend we maintained tradition by having the CCDC booth at Fiesta La Ballona but this year was a vivid reminder of why our Democratic club exists. We are the bridge between community and democracy. There was plenty of great food, good music and warm laughter but what truly stood out to me were the conversations with middle and high school students. These young people asked thoughtful questions about climate action, the ongoing violation of rights by ICE, Gaza, and even concerns regarding the decaying checks and balances by the federal government. They demonstrated that civic engagement doesn't begin at 18, it starts the moment they realize their voices are heard and valued.

Our presence at Fiesta La Ballona wasn't just about visibility, it was about planting seeds. By inviting these students into dialogue, I hope I was able to show them that politics is not some distant adult realm, but a shared community project in which they have a stake and a say. That's why our Club must continue to show up, be welcoming, listen actively, and encourage their participation. When they see us treating them as part of the democratic process, they'll grow up believing they belong there and be ready to lead.

Equally important is the work we do now to secure that future, and one crucial step I'm preparing for is supporting Proposition 50 on November 4. Prop 50, or the "Election Rigging Response Act," is California's response to partisan gerrymandering efforts elsewhere in the country.

It would allow for a temporary redrawing of congressional districts to counter Republican-led distortion in states like Texas, and protect fair representation for California in coming elections. To put it plainly, Texas tried to cheat and California is reminding the Texas GOP and the Trump administration that democracy represents all—not just ones that a childish President wants to let in to his exclusive country club. In the words of Assemblyman Isaac Bryan, "When they go low, we squabble up."

While we have not yet voted to endorse this ballot measure, I wanted to share my personal thoughts and hope that you will have similar feelings. We will be bringing this up for endorsement at our meeting on September 8. Democracy is shaped by those who fight for its integrity and now is the time for everyone, across all generations, to stand up and fight!



GOD'S COUNTRY is Great

With so many people perplexed about what to watch next on streaming, I'd like to propose a movie of quality. *God's Country* (and I'm not talking about the Blake Shelton song) was almost entirely missed by folks due to distribution and promotion failure in 2022.

This quietly affecting independant film, written and directed by Julian Higgins and shot with great sensitivity by cinematographer Andrew Wheeler, deserves your attention.

According to the Internet Movie Data Base, *God's Country* tells a simple story about "an escalating conflict between individuals but can also be seen as a take on what is happening in the USA today." Too true.

Shot by Wheeler in the forbidding but beautiful winter of Montana, the magnificence of the chilling landscape plays a vital character in the drama of Sandra Guidry. A Black professor of communications and a survivor of New Orleans' Katrina tragedy, she flees the indifference and ineptitude of society and government. In the face of that catastrophe she seeks a clean slate. She chooses to find license to live free and be her own gifted person in the wilds of Montana.

Based on the short story "Winter Light"


by James Lee Burke, this indie began as a short film at the American Film Institute in 2015. Substituting a female lead for the original male protagonist in the story was an act of bravery and insight by Higgins. It compellingly reflects back to us the strain on Black females in current American culture.

Seeking refuge and a dignified existence, Sandra settles in the predominantly white domain of Montana, on her own piece of land, in God's Country. What follows is a fight for the privileges of that land, a fight for human decency and ultimately a fight for life. Thandie Newton delivers a powerful, intimate and deeply resonant performance as Sandra. Her wonderful work was ignored by both the Globes and the Oscars in 2022, despite deserving a nomination as lead actress in a film. But I'm happily here to tell you the film has now returned, streaming on AMC plus, and available for rental through Apple, Amazon and YouTube, you've got a chance to see its depths. In absolute disclosure, the cinematographer is my son-in-law of whom I am proud; I am prouder still of his skillful eye on the landscape of racism and sexism in this affecting film.

It's also disturbing, but facing disturbing truths is the only real remedy for social injustice, which is alive and kicking in many features of American society.

In "God's Country" one woman is forced by unsettling circumstances to take matters into her own hands. Don't miss the searing conclusion.

Early returns on Measure CL seeing big lead on "YES"

Preliminary voting results on Measure CL, which would impose a general sales tax at the rate of 1/4-cent per dollar, have been released. As of 10 pm on Tuesday, August 26, 2025, a majority of Culver City voters are in favor of the ballot measure.

On Tuesday, August 26th at 8:01 PM, in the City Council Chambers, the City Clerk's Office began the official tabulation of all Vote by Mail (VBM) election ballots for Measure CL. The public observed both in person and virtually on a livestream.

Ballots, which had been received by mail or retrieved from the drop boxes and signature verified prior to Election Day, were tabulated. At the end of the evening, 5,920 number of ballots were tabulated, with the preliminary results as follows:

YES: 3,974 votes (67.1%) NO: 1,946 votes (32.9%) TOTAL: 5,920 votes

Ballots mailed and received up to seven (7) days following the election, with postmarks on or before election day, will be processed. Canvassing and preparation of those ballots will begin at or after 7:30 AM on Wednesday, August 27, 2025 at City Hall. The post-election day count of the second batch of VBM ballots will commence at 11 AM on Thursday, September 4th at City Hall in the Mike Balkman Council Chambers.

The final results will be certified at the City Council Meeting on Monday, September 8, 2025.

Sharp WEAPONS

I purposely have read no other reviews of WEAPONS, the recent box office horror film causing so much talk. And I assume much has been written.

I thoroughly enjoyed the film, which I saw last night. But unlike viewers who compare it to *The Shining* or *Rosemary's Baby*, I found it having more in common with Jordan Peele's brand of comic horror.

I saw a brilliant satire, in the horror genre, with a large helping of Bruno Bettleheim-style fairy tale imagery as its foundational core. Essentially the "children going missing" trope in the opening of the story (although suspenseful and initially very alarming) is sort of the Hitchcock "McGuffin" which sets this comic horror film in motion.

From there we do not actively follow any frantic police search for the children (although it's referenced as happening.) Instead we enter the nutty life of a small town where the citizenry are up in arms about a boozy third grade teacher, Justine, from whose class all the kids (save one) have been "transported." Justine is literally labeled a witch by the town. But, surprise! The town has the wrong witch in its sights! The underpinnings of the entire story revolve around a real witch named Aunt Gladys who is casting horrifying spells on the town of Maybrook. It is she who has taken the children as "weapons," a kind of mini arsenal she can ultimately use while she is causing mass zombie-like, violent insanity amongst the terrified townsfolk.

The actual witch, played with spectacular aplomb by the often under-sung Amy Madigan, is the "rotten core" of the story. Aunt Gladys is a modern, re-energized and ingenious throwback to Grimm's fairytale witches. With her phantasmagoric orange wig and her chipper ability to entrance all onlookers, the spectacular Madigan draws us completely into her witchy web.

Using the branch of a mysterious thorny tree and the hair from any living person, she can gain power over them to do her bidding. It is she who has cast a spell over the children. Why does she do it? I don't know—Why does any witch do anything? Because she can!

Alas, things don't go as planned in fairy tales, and just as Hansel and Gretel eventually push the wicked witch into her own oven, the entranced children, set free by one of their own, ultimately "devour" Aunt Gladys. And it's a moment all of us grown-up children in the audience must applaud.

Weapons is a rollicking good ride, with just the right blend of comedy, gore and genuine scares to please anyone. I haven't seen an audience as exhilarated and genuinely entertained since Jordan Peele brought Get Out, Us, and Nope into the world. Weapons also stands in league with the Coen Brother's "Fargo"—one of the great comic / suspense / dash-of-horror films of the last decade.

Josh Brolin, Julia Garner, Austin Abrams, and Alden Ehrenreich, play the main small town folks—the aggrieved father, the suspected schoolteacher, the town drug addict, and the over-zealous cop. They are each absolutely terrific in their very original performances.

But Amy Madigan nearly steals the show. As the mysterious Aunt Gladys, (having something in common with the clown in *IT*) she embodies the worse childhood nightmares we have of craven, powerful witches who want to enslave and do us all manner of harm.

And if the trope of the witch is essentially misogynistic in nature, I still had a hell of a good time in the world of Zach Cregger, who wrote and directed this admirable film where genuine laughs, real suspense, over the top horror, and even a touch of sexy romance blend so effortlessly.

So, for a good time and a feeling of triumph over childhood adversity, see this film!


